## 1 INTRODUCTION

## 2 THE BIBLIOGRAPHY STYLE

The style for bibliographic references is `natbib.sty` with `apalike.bst`. If you want to use the `lap` citation style, you can add the class option `lap` (see the example in the sources of this document). In that case `\cite` gives the author name plus the year between braces; `\cite*` gives only the year.

An example of a `natbib`-style reference is Doe (1998). If you want the whole reference between braces, use (Doe, 1998) or (e.g. Doe, 1998). Refer to the `natbib`-documentation for more options.

Please do not make extensive use of footnotes.<sup>1</sup>
